Cables exiting a distribution box must be properly sized, securely connected, and protected to ensure safe and reliable electrical distribution.

Cable Connections and Sizing

Cables leaving a distribution box are typically connected to screw terminals or busbars inside the enclosure. The cable gauge must match or exceed the incoming supply cable to handle the current safely, and the maximum recommended cable cross-section is often around 10 mm² for standard domestic or light commercial installations . If the distribution box feeds another unit, an external fuse should be installed before the box to protect the downstream circuit .

Protective Devices

Distribution boxes contain circuit breakers, MCBs, and RCCBs to protect individual circuits from overloads or short circuits . The main switch or main MCB controls the entire supply, while single-pole or double-pole breakers manage outgoing circuits. Proper grounding through earth bars is essential for safety, and neutral bars complete the circuit back to the source .

Exiting the Box

When routing cables from inside the distribution box to external devices or circuits, it is important to:

- o Use cable clamps or gland fittings at the knockout points to secure the cable and prevent strain on the terminals.
- o Consider conduit or flexible water-tight tubing if the cable passes through walls or is exposed to moisture, to prevent damage and comply with electrical codes .
- o Ensure that the exit point is sealed against water intrusion if the box is mounted outdoors or in damp areas .

Best Practices

- o Always switch off the power before connecting or disconnecting cables .
- o Maintain a neat and organized layout inside the box to avoid accidental contact with live parts.
- o Verify that all connections are tight and corrosion-free to prevent overheating or arcing.
- o Follow local electrical codes for cable routing, conduit use, and protective devices to ensure safety and inspection compliance . By following these guidelines, cables exiting a distribution box can safely deliver power to downstream circuits while minimizing the risk of electrical faults or hazards.
