- o CO2 extinguishers: Effective for electrical fires below 600 volts, leave no residue, and are non-conductive .
- o Phosphate-based dry powder extinguishers: Suitable for high-voltage equipment, versatile for Class A, B, C, and E fires, though they may leave residue .
- o Heptafluoropropane extinguishers: Clean agents that protect sensitive equipment without damage . Proper
