

How to assign wire numbers to the distribution cabinet

Core Principles

- o Readability: Use clear fonts (e.g., Song or Kai typeface) with appropriate sizes--10-12 pt for main wires, 8-10 pt for control wires. Ensure high contrast between the label and wire color .
- o Continuity: Wire numbers should remain consistent along the entire length of the wire, from origin to termination .
- o Correspondence: Numbers should reflect the wire's function, ownership, and connection relationships, making it easy to trace and verify .

Common Numbering Methods

- o Sequential Numbering: Number wires in order, starting from the incoming power line or main terminal. For example, 1, 2, 3... This helps track current flow and wiring sequence .
- o Function Grouping: Assign number ranges based on circuit function. For instance, motor starting circuits may use 100-199, while motor protection circuits use 200-299 .
- o Component + Pin Number: Include the component abbreviation and pin number, e.g., KM1-3 for the third pin of contactor KM1. This method is useful for complex cabinets .
- o Location + Function: Combine spatial location and function, e.g., L-S1-M for a wire on the left side related to motor start. This aids in identifying wires by both position and purpose .
- o Drawing-Based Numbering: Use the electrical drawing's sheet and row numbers to derive wire numbers, especially for multi-panel systems. Ensure consistent origin points to avoid duplication .

Practical Tips

- o Label both ends of each wire using tags, printed labels, or metal nameplates .
- o Cross-reference wire numbers with wiring diagrams to verify connections and functions .
- o For large systems, maintain a master tag list to standardize numbering across panels and circuits .
- o Use prefixes for different types of circuits, such as LJB- for lighting junction boxes or PJB- for power junction boxes . By following these principles and methods, wire numbers will be clear, traceable, and compliant with standards, facilitating installation, maintenance, and troubleshooting in distribution cabinets.
