

How to unload cables from cable trays

- o Use fish tapes or pull rods to extract cables running through walls or ceilings ().
- o Organize removed cables and clean the area to maintain a safe and clutter-free environment ().

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o Support long cable runs with temporary cleats or rollers to prevent tension or mechanical stress ().
