A red light on a fiber optic router usually indicates a Loss of Signal (LOS), often caused by cable issues, polarity errors, or router/ONT problems.

Common Causes

- o Loss of Signal (LOS): A solid or blinking red light typically signals that the router cannot detect the incoming optical signal from your ISP .
- o Fiber Optic Cable Damage: Physical cuts, bends, or kinks in the fiber cable can disrupt the signal .
- o Loose or Improper Connections: The fiber cable may not be fully seated in the WAN/ONT port, or connectors may be faulty .
- o Polarity Issues: Fiber cables are full-duplex, requiring the Transmit (Tx) on one end to connect to Receive (Rx) on the other. If Tx is connected to Tx and Rx to Rx, the link will remain red .
- o Router or ONT Malfunction: Hardware issues or firmware problems can prevent the router from establishing a proper connection .
- o Service Outage: ISP maintenance or local outages can also cause the red light .

Troubleshooting Steps

- o Check for ISP Outages: Visit your ISP's website or social media for service updates .
- o Inspect the Fiber Cable: Look for visible damage and ensure it is properly connected to the router's WAN/ONT port .
- o Verify Polarity: Ensure Tx on one device connects to Rx on the other. If using a duplex LC-LC patch cable, flipping one end 180° often resolves polarity issues .
- o Reboot the Router: Power off the router, wait 30 seconds, then power it back on .
- o Check All Connections: Confirm that power, LAN, and fiber cables are securely connected .
- o Update Firmware: Use the router's app or admin panel to check for pending firmware updates .
- o Contact ISP or Technician: If the red light persists after these steps, an on-site technician may be required to inspect the fiber line or replace faulty equipment .

Key Tip

For fiber links, the Tx/Rx polarity is often the simplest fix. Even if the cable and SFPs are new, flipping one end of the fiber cable can restore the connection without additional tools . Following these steps usually resolves the red light issue and restores your fiber optic internet connection.
