

# The main switch of the secondary distribution box tripped

### Common Causes

- o **Inspect wiring:** Look for visible damage, frayed wires, or scorch marks around outlets and the distribution box .
- o **Call a licensed electrician:** If the cause is not obvious or the switch continues to trip, a professional should inspect the system, test the RCD, and ensure compliance with safety regulations .
