

What type of optical connector cable should be used on the switch

Use duplex LC fiber optic patch cables for most modern switches, or MPO/MTP cables for high-speed parallel connections.

Recommended Cable Types

For standard network switches with SFP or SFP+ transceivers, duplex LC fiber optic cables are the most common choice. These cables have two strands--one for transmitting and one for receiving--and are compatible with most 1G, 10G, and 25G SFP modules . When connecting the cable, ensure the transmit (TX) port on one switch connects to the receive (RX) port on the other switch, maintaining proper polarity .

For high-speed connections such as 40G, 100G, or 400G, MPO/MTP multi-fiber connectors are used. These connectors support parallel optics, allowing multiple fibers to transmit simultaneously, which is essential for high-bandwidth applications . MPO/MTP cables are typically used for spine-leaf interconnects or data center backbone links .

Fiber Mode Selection

- o Single-mode fiber (SMF): Best for long-distance connections, typically beyond 500 meters, and used with single-mode SFP modules .
- o Multimode fiber (MMF): Suitable for short-distance intra-data center links, usually up to 500 meters, and compatible with OM3, OM4, or OM5 fiber types .

Connector and Jacket Considerations

- o Connector type: Match the transceiver port (LC for duplex SFP/SFP+, MPO/MTP for parallel QSFP or 400G modules), .
- o Jacket type: Choose according to installation environment--PVC for basic indoor use, OFNP (plenum) for air ducts, OFNR (riser) for vertical shafts, or LSZH for low-smoke, high-safety areas .
- o Cable length: Avoid excess slack to reduce signal loss and maintain proper cable management .

- o Server to Top-of-Rack (ToR) switch: LC duplex patch cable, multimode for short runs, single-mode for longer runs .
- o Leaf to Spine or high-speed interconnects: MPO/MTP trunk cables with appropriate breakout patch cords .
- o Future-proofing for 400G/800G clusters: Consider MDC/CS duplex or MPO/MTP parallel patching .
